Process:

- Students will choose classes through Aeries portal in March
- Teachers and counselors will present information in classes
- Counselors are available for drop in help during the course selection window

Resources:

- Course catalog: contains descriptions of every AHS class, requirements and prerequisites, sample schedules
- Course lists for each grade
- Transcript: tracks credit progress and needs
- Students are responsible for checking prerequisites and course placement is subject to teacher approval
- Pay attention to special policies (ex: requesting two courses in the same subject area)
- Students will be notified of major schedule conflicts in August. Final schedules are available on Opening Day the week before school starts. We will offer a schedule change period before the first day of school.

- "Electives" includes any class taken in other subject areas after requirement is met (e.g. 3rd year of math)

Add the following for 4-year college eligibility:

- 3 years of math required, 4 years recommended
- 3 years of science recommended
- 2 years of the same Language Other Than English required, 3 years recommended
- Only grades of C- and higher meet eligibility requirements (D- earns credit for graduation)

What do AHS students do after graduation?

- Open enrollment to anyone with a high school diploma OR age 18+
- Options for career/technical education, Associate's degree, transfer to 4-year university
- California community colleges have transfer agreements with Cal State University (CSU) and University of California (UC) systems
 - Complete general education requirements at CC, transfer to complete major requirements at CSU or UC and graduate with a Bachelor's degree (see <u>assist.org</u> for more details)
- Affordable or even free tuition. Save \$!



- Public universities include
 - University of California (UC) 9 campuses
 - California State University (CSU) 23 campuses
 - Out of state public universities all 50 states (e.g. University of Texas, Oregon State)
- Private universities in and out of state (e.g. University of Southern California, Duke, Boston College)
- <u>Resources for affiliate groups</u> (Historically Black Colleges & Universities, Hispanic-Serving Institutions, Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institutions, and more)

- Admissions requirements vary:
 - CSU requires **2.5 GPA** and **completion of 15 required classes**
 - San Francisco State and Cal State East Bay are our local service area schools: meet minimum requirements = guaranteed admission!
 - UC requires 3.0 GPA, completion of requirements, and considers extracurricular activities, essays, and other factors ("comprehensive review")
 - Many out-of-state public and private colleges also require recommendation letters from teachers/counselors and may require or prefer SAT/ACT scores (not accepted by CSU/UC)




- Since the COVID pandemic, college testing requirements have changed.
 - CSU and UC do not accept SAT/ACT
 - Many colleges and universities are test-optional
- Reasons to consider SAT/ACT
 - A growing number of colleges are starting to require them again
 - Some scholarships/majors may require or prefer them
 - Test scores can help your application
- If you do plan to take these tests, we recommend this timeline:
 - PSAT in October of 11th grade (at AHS)
 - <u>SAT</u> or <u>ACT</u> in spring of 11th grade (AHS is not a test site. Register directly through the testing agencies' websites)
 - Most colleges accept scores through winter of 12th grade
 - Be aware: space has been limited at many local test sites. Plan ahead!



- Most student aid is accessed by filing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid):
 - Federal grants (Pell Grant) and California grants (Cal Grant)
 - Federally-subsidized loans
 - Work study
 - Institutional aid (e.g. UC Middle Class Scholarship)
- <u>WUE</u> Western Undergraduate Exchange: an agreement between 16 Western states/territories to provide non-resident tuition savings
- Local and private scholarships: available on AHS website, Xello and elsewhere. Cater to local students and/or specific populations, interests, goals.
- AHS holds financial aid nights twice a year (fall and spring) for students and parents/guardians



- Xello is a college/career exploration tool that all AHS students have access to through their AUSD accounts
- Career inventories make suggestions based on interests, personality, learning style etc.
- Search careers, colleges and majors using filters like salary or location
- Resources for other post-secondary options are also covered

Think of us as a bridge to help connect students to academics (teachers, grades, transcripts, schedules and post secondary options i.e. college), personal social (having a hard day, family problems, need extra support) and community based learning opportunities (i.e internships, leadership opportunities, employment)
